In 2022, BC Agriculture Council (BCAC) celebrated a historic 25 years of serving and advocating for B.C.'s farmers and ranchers. Yet the need for an advocate for agriculture had never been more clearly apparent as recovery efforts from the devastating floods of fall 2021 had barely begun.

The Council was proud to steward the generous donation fund resulting from the overwhelming community support and organizations who stepped up to help farmers.

Thank you to everyone who donated.

Through our members, BCAC distributed \$800,000 to producers for flood recovery efforts.

We also appreciated opportunities to represent the concerns of farmers and ranchers to the Honourable Marie-Claude Bibeau, the Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada, in our follow-up meetings. The purpose of these meetings was to learn how producers are adapting to and mitigating the effects of climate change, and what government can do to support the sector in this work.

We are confident the voices of B.C.'s farmers and ranchers were heard.

While 2022 was not without its challenges, we started to see some normalcy returning to our businesses and lives. We were thrilled to conduct meetings in person again, especially during Ag Day in Victoria, BCAC's annual advocacy event, where farmers and ranchers from across the province meet in person with cabinet ministers, MLAs, and senior government officials.

One of the key successes of the year was immediately following Ag Day in Victoria as the B.C. Ministry of Agriculture and Food asked BCAC to establish a Working Group to help guide the delivery of mandate letter commitments and the related work of the Minister's Advisory Group on Regenerative Agriculture and Agritech (AGRAA).

The Working Group was tasked with advising on the implementation of the draft strategic framework developed by the AGRAA. The group was also asked to identify early, mid-, and long-term opportunities for the

Executive Director Report



By: Danielle Synotte - This past year was an exciting year for BCAC with the return of in-person meetings, events, and conferences which allowed us much needed face-to-face time to ensure the priorities of British Columbia's producers are at the forefront for all levels of government. BCAC ensured farmers and ranchers were heard on:

The rising costs of inputs: In addition to continuously advocating for additional support for the sector provincially, BCAC has been an active participant on the Canadian Federation of Agriculture's advisory committee on the subject, providing solutions for rising input costs at the federal level.

Task force on land use: BCAC initiated discussions with the provincial

government to launch a government-industry task force to review the threshold for property tax reductions and lowered municipal levies.

Securing access to water: BCAC is an active and integral contributor to the province's development of a Watershed Security Strategy including pressing for protections for agricultural water uses and renewing discussions of an agricultural water reserve.

Safeguarding farmers and their families: We have made it clear that meaningful penalties for trespassing on farms need to be included within provincial legislation; these safeguards should ensure the safety of farmers, their families, and their operations. We are proud to report that through our collaborative discussions with the Ministry of Agriculture and Food (MAF), they have committed to striking a joint taskforce with industry in the fall of 2023 to reopen dialogue on this important matter.

Ensuring Ag is "on the agenda": BCAC is committed to ensuring that agriculture is considered in all areas of government policy that may impact farmers and producers, whether intentionally or unintentionally.

We believe that agriculture should be on the agenda throughout government, not just with the Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

To that end, we have presented several submissions to governments on topics ranging from hazardous work protection for youth, single-use plastics, integrated pest-management regulation, AgriRecovery negotiations, trespassing, the National School Food Policy, and the Fertilizer Emission Reduction Strategy.

LOOKING AHEAD

Our collective voice was a key driver behind the additional investments for the agriculture sector in the 2023 provincial government budget announcement.

BCAC, along with its members, presented to the Select Standing Committee on Finance and was pleased to see our recommendations mentioned at the top of the 2023 Budget Consultation Report.

In addition to BCAC's policy projects, our community of organizations dedicated to agriculture have helped to position our sector as an economic driver in British Columbia - ripe with opportunity!

Our relationships within the MAF are strong and I am excited to roll up my sleeves with a new minister and executive team as we - together - advance our shared sector priorities. Thank you all for the parts you have played in BCAC's progress in 2022 - we have a lot to be proud of.

Undoubtedly, the last few years of extreme weather events and the pandemic have brought the need for emergency preparedness to the forefront for every single British Columbian. BCAC will champion support for producers to ensure our food and agricultural systems are ready for future challenges. With the provincial government's emphasis on food security, BCAC sees opportunity to advance many of the sector's priorities:

- We will push for access to water for farmers and producers. Hotter, drier summers mean more water from irrigation is required to keep crops growing. If we can't keep crops growing, we can't produce food.
- We continue to advocate for a robust response from government to the ongoing labour shortages. Without workers, food and plants do not get planted and will not get harvested.
- We will look to see investment in processing so that producers can build processing capacity on-farm.

As 2023 marks the 50th anniversary of the ALR, ensuring the sustainability of the agricultural sector for the next 50 plus years is key. BCAC will press for a commitment from the province to carry out a review of Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) regulations – what farmers are allowed to do on their land – to make sure those regulations serve our current and future food needs. The purpose of the review is to better reflect the realities of modern farming and empower farmers and ranchers to make decisions that best reflect the needs of their operations.

BCAC supports the provincial government's focus on building Indigenous food sovereignty and looks forward to exploring ways to support those efforts. We will continue to prioritize influencing the provincial government's impact on agriculture through the Minister's Advisory Group on Regenerative Agriculture and Agritech.

The start of a new five-year Canadian Agricultural Partnership (CAP) agreement funding cycle begins in 2023 and BCAC will work closely with members to ensure programming needs are met as we engage with government on CAP consultations.

Stakeholder Engagement

The year began with uncertainty related to the COVID-19 pandemic. With the Pacific Agriculture Show being postponed until April, BCAC made the decision to once again hold its popular in-person Gala virtually. However, public health orders were allowing small group gatherings, motivating us to do something in person.

In March, we held a President's Dinner in Abbotsford for the lead board representative from each of our member associations. Then Minister of Agriculture and Food, Lana Popham, also attended with her newly appointed Deputy Minister, Peter Pokorny. The evening also included BCAC's awards presentation, recognizing three British Columbians who have made significant contributions in terms of advocacy, leadership, and growing understanding of agriculture in B.C. They were:

- Bill Zylmans BCAC Excellence in Agriculture Leadership
- Christine Koch Scotiabank Award Ally of Agriculture
- Robin Ruff Outstanding Teacher Award

The summer of 2022 included negotiations for what would become the new Sustainable Canadian Agricultural Partnership (SCAP) agreement, a 5-year, \$3.5 billion agreement between federal, provincial and territorial governments. At this time, the Federal-Provincial-Territorial (FPT) roundtable meetings took place in conjunction with the Canadian Federation of Agriculture's semi-annual meetings. This is where all provinces had the opportunity to openly discuss possible changes to investment in the government programs. BCAC attended the FPT meeting in Saskatoon and represented B.C. alongside our Minister of Agriculture.

AGRICULTURE EDUCATION & AWARENESS

Coming out of the pandemic and the 2021 flooding events, consumers' heightened sensitivity to food security has shifted people's concerns about farming. In the spring of 2022, BCAC embarked on a transition year for its work on growing our community's understanding of agriculture in B.C., starting with undertaking a consumer study of greater depth that would primarily be used to assist with decision making about how to best communicate with the public about the agriculture industry. We then started the transitioning of content (e.g. farmer profiles) from We Heart Local (WHL) over to BCAC digital platforms (see websites below).

Western Agriculture Labour Initiative

As we began emerging from the pandemic, 2022 proved to be a good year but it did bring with it some new challenges. We must start by saying thank you to the B.C. government for coordinating and funding the centralized quarantine program for foreign workers. Looking after this requirement allowed employers to focus on keeping staff safe while working. It also reduced the concerns that workers had about travelling during the pandemic.

Re-opening the economy brought forward the critical labour crisis several industries had anticipated about even pre-pandemic. From construction to hospitality, several sectors were struggling to find enough qualified staff. This shortage magnified the labour challenge that farmers have faced for several years.

BCAC's subsidiary, the Western Agriculture Labour Initiative (WALI), continued working with employers and source countries using the Seasonal Agriculture Worker Program (SAWP). WALI also worked with governments and B.C. registered recruiting companies to assist employers wanting to hire workers through the AgStream program. We saw expanding interest in using AgStream and will continue to develop this service.

The total number of temporary foreign workers (TFWs) that arrived in B.C. in 2022 saw levels recovering to those nearing pre-pandemic numbers.

WALI launched its online Employer Portal in 2022 to provide employers better access to information. We experienced the expected start-up hiccups, but thanks to employer patience and input, the system helped us to better manage and share information.



While TFWs continue to be critical to the farm labour market, we must look at all solutions. WALI has actively participated in the development of the National Workforce Strategic Plan. This plan provides a holistic look at the labour challenges facing Canadian farmers and food manufacturers. It will provide the framework that WALI and BCAC will use to continue helping farmers meet their labour needs.

LOOKING AHEAD

As we look forward, the WALI team is adding capacity for the 2023 season to ensure the timely processing of LMIAs and responses to employer inquiries.

To improve the integrity and consistency of housing inspections, WALI is working towards including the inspection process in the online Employer Portal.

Working with the Consulate of Mexico, WALI will work towards administering most of the SAWP transfers in B.C. The Consulate has managed the transfer process since the start of the program in B.C., but no longer has the resources to do so.

BCAC has received federal funding for WALI to conduct end-of-term surveys with workers before they return home. This data will help employers identify and prioritize ways to improve the quality of life for workers while in B.C. and, in turn, contribute to higher return rates. The Auditor General of Canada's 2021 report on the Health and Safety of Agricultural Temporary Foreign Workers in Canada During the COVID-19 Pandemic stated that government needs to do a better job protecting TFWs. WALI, together with other national and provincial farm organizations, has been working with the federal government to take steps to ensure workers have a safe and rewarding experience while in Canada. This, in turn, helps ensure farmers have access to reliable and affordable workers. We expect more developments on these policies in 2023.

WALI understands that finding and keeping labour is a growing challenge for all B.C. farmers and ranchers. We have a talented and dedicated team to help tackle this issue.

Policy Development

With the strategic restructuring mid-year of 2021, BCAC was successful in transitioning the on-farm programs, previously administered by Agriculture Research & Development Corporation (ARDCorp), to Investment Agriculture Foundation. By 2022, we were well-positioned to continue our focus on building BCAC's policy development capacity. In February, Paul Pryce, Director of Policy, was welcomed onto the BCAC team to advance the priorities of the agriculture sector. We are excited to highlight some key successes as a result of his direct contributions.

HIGHLIGHTS

Consultations were held with members to identify key priority areas for 2022 and onward:

Water Security and Management Land Use Access to Labour Environment and Climate Change Farm Business

Since then, policy committees have been formed for most of these priorities, ensuring producers have direct input into the positions BCAC presents to government (See Table 1).

With B.C.'s *Watershed Security Strategy* consultations, BCAC advocated for measures to ensure agricultural production is supported by reliable access to safe, quality water. BCAC is also pressing for significant changes to groundwater licensing that will make the process more responsive to the needs of farmers and ranchers.



BCAC presented to the **Standing Senate Committee on Agriculture and Forestry**, and many of our recommendations were included in that committee's final report *Treading Water: The Impact of and Response to the 2021 British Columbia Floods*. BCAC also actively participated in a Canadian Federation of Agriculture committee, highlighting and advocating for policy solutions to rising input costs. BCAC also consulted on B.C.'s Single-Use Plastics Action Plan.

BCAC also pressed for continued access for farmers to pest management tools like second-generation anticoagulant rodenticides. By working collaboratively with policy-makers, **BCAC also prevented burdensome new regulations that would have duplicated existing workplace safety standards.**

Concluding the year, we were thrilled to have Emily Townsend join BCAC in a part-time Policy Coordinator role. This position will further advance the important work of ensuring the needs and interests of B.C.'s farmers and ranchers are reflected in government policies.

Farmer Identity Card Program

As the impacts of the pandemic lessened throughout 2022, BCAC's Farmer ID Card sales increased, seeing sales rise by 18% compared to 2021!

BCAC continued to partner with the Advanced Selling class at the University of the Fraser Valley on a Farmer ID Card sales campaign. After two months of classroom training, students worked in teams, contacting farmers on the renewals list, from their personal networks, and from their own prospecting efforts. By the end of November, students had succeeded in selling Farmer ID cards resulting in \$4,305 in renewals and new sales for BCAC.

Our team continues to look at ways to grow the Farmer ID Card program by understanding how to improve awareness of the card among farmers and which marketing channels are most effective at reaching prospective cardholders. With the benefits it offers, the Farmer ID Card can save B.C.'s farmers and ranchers both time and money so we want to see it reach as many producers as possible.
