PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As we conclude another year, I want to take a moment to celebrate the resilience, innovation, and unwavering commitment of our province's farmers and ranchers. While 2024 presented its share of challenges, the agricultural community rose to the occasion with remarkable perseverance and adaptability. Your dedication and ingenuity continue to inspire and strengthen the future of agriculture in our province.

On behalf of the Council's Board of Directors, I am proud of the work undertaken in 2024 and the accomplishments we achieved as an organization. Our benchmarks for success involve ensuring that BCAC is included in conversations that impact the agriculture sector, contributing meaningfully to those discussions, and providing tangible value to our members.

The Council's core activity areas guide our organizational direction, while our member-driven priorities shape our strategic objectives and efforts. Over the past two years as President, it has been a pleasure to engage with the member organizations that propel the important work of the Council and to connect with the dedicated people who work tirelessly behind the scenes on behalf of our farmers and ranchers.

In 2024, the teams at both **BC Agriculture Council (BCAC)** and the **Western Agriculture Labour Initiative (WALI)** worked tirelessly to ensure that farmers' voices were heard where it mattered most. Increasingly, the teams at WALI, BCAC, and our member associations have become key influencers in policy decision-making that supports the long-term viability of our sector—whether it's improving water security, enhancing labour access, or strengthening business risk management programs.

ADVOCACY AND POLICY INFLUENCE

In the first half of the year, the Council advanced members' top priorities on key files such as water security, cost of production, labour, and emergency management. For example, BCAC actively participated in the development of the Province of B.C.'s Watershed Security Strategy, advocating for the formal establishment of agricultural water reserves.

An unexpected policy change to the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) Use Regulations, which proposed eliminating the "50/50 rule," emerged early in the year, adding to an already full list of sector priorities. Consultations on this change are ongoing, and efforts by those advocating for the removal of this rule continue. BCAC remains engaged with our membership as this issue evolves, recognizing its potential precedent-setting impacts on the future of agricultural land in B.C.

PROVINCIAL ELECTION ENGAGEMENT

Mid-year, BCAC, in partnership with our member associations, developed the sector's top priorities and proposed solutions to be advanced in the months leading up to the provincial election. From summer through fall, BCAC Board Directors traveled across the province to connect with MLA candidates from all parties, personally delivering these key

messages directly from farmers. These meetings were well-received, with candidates expressing appreciation for the engaging and informative discussions.

The Council's goal was threefold:

1. Deliver sector priorities and solutions,
2. See these priorities reflected in party platforms, and
3. Ensure sector priorities are incorporated into mandate letters.

I am pleased to report that all these goals were achieved.

RAISING OUR PUBLIC PROFILE

The Council continued its efforts to grow its public profile, resulting in increased demand for engagement, consultation, and media interviews across all levels of government. At the local level, BCAC broadened its relationship network by actively participating in the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) Convention in September. Our "Level the Field for BC Farmers and Ranchers" campaign at the tradeshow booth was well-received and generated meaningful engagement.

NATIONAL ADVOCACY & COLLABORATION

Federally, BCAC continued its active participation in the work of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture (CFA), ensuring that B.C. farmers' concerns were advanced at the Annual General Meeting (AGM).

BCAC successfully had two resolutions supported and passed at the AGM.

BCAC also participated alongside Minister Alexis (then B.C. Minister of Agriculture and Food) at the Ministerial Roundtable during the Federal-Provincial-Territorial meeting.

LOOKING AHEAD

We remain committed to ensuring strong representation on both the Premier's Task Force on Agriculture and Food Economy and the Premier's Task Force on Trade and Economic Security. Our goal is clear: to advance policies and initiatives that will drive competitiveness and growth for B.C.'s agriculture sector and the people who work within it.

IN CLOSING

I want to extend my sincere gratitude to our members, their boards, our dedicated team at BCAC, and the many partners and sponsors who contribute to our shared success. Thank you for your commitment to B.C. agriculture and your trust and confidence in me as President. It has been an honour to represent you and advocate for your interests.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

BC Agriculture Council has had a transformative year, marked by strong advocacy, meaningful government relations, and a commitment to our members during a pivotal provincial election year.

Throughout the year, we have championed key issues that matter to our members, ensuring their voices are heard at every level of government. As I have said before, our investment into working proactively on policy development has resulted in the federal and provincial governments increasingly relying upon BCAC for consultation and input relevant to the interests of BCAC's member associations. As a result, policies, processes, and programs adopted by both levels of government also increasingly reflect these member interests.

Our advocacy efforts have strengthened our profile and influence, allowing us to engage directly with decision-makers on key issues affecting our members. Through proactive government relations, we have also built and reinforced relationships that position us as a trusted voice during policy discussions and in shaping policies and processes that matter.

In 2024, our sector-wide priorities included:

- **Cost of Production:** *Carbon Tax advocacy, minimum wage subsidy, tax exemption on insurance premiums, Advance Payments Program (APP) supplement.*
- **Water Security and Storage:** *Agricultural Water Reserves, investment for storage, groundwater licensing.*

- **Labour:** *MSP coverage delays for temporary foreign Workers (TFW), flexibility for TFWs to move between farms, housing shortage driving up the cost of providing housing for workers.*
- **Emergency Management and Climate Preparedness:** *Disaster Financial Assistance Program improvements, Food Security Planning & Preparedness Project: Provincial Agriculture Emergency Liaison Training Development, seat in Emergency Operations Centers (regional), pre-qualified pass permits.*

BCAC engaged in several unexpected advocacy discussions and consultations on matters that directly impacted the agriculture sector, whether it was a new bill being proposed (e.g. Bill-12) or changes to regulations under the Agricultural Land Act. Never a dull moment!

The 2024 provincial election presented both challenges and opportunities. We worked diligently to inform candidates and advance our collective priorities while navigating the evolving political landscape. In lieu of our annual lobby day (Ag Day in Victoria), we mobilized our Board of Directors who presented our sector-wide



priorities in each region of the province from July to October. This approach was to personally deliver all party candidates first-hand information on the challenges the sector is facing and present ideas for opportunities stating:

“Solutions FOR the sector should come FROM the sector.”

BCAC and its members received strong praise from candidates and government staff for developing a well-thought-out list of priorities with actionable ideas for solutions. The agriculture sector’s priorities were strongly captured across all party platforms and the Council was even named as a contributor to some platform commitments.

Engagement with our members remains at the heart of what we do. Through consultations, events, and direct outreach, we have fostered stronger connections and deeper collaboration, ensuring that our initiatives align with the needs of those we serve. The insights and feedback from our members have been invaluable in shaping our direction as an organization and reinforcing the impact of our advocacy.

This year also marked a significant milestone as we conducted a comprehensive review of our 2022-2025 strategic plan. This process reaffirmed our vision, mission, and priorities, and allowed us to refine our path forward by reflecting on our progress while assessing emerging challenges. With a clear vision and renewed focus, we are well-positioned to build on our successes and continue delivering meaningful outcomes.

As we reflect on the past year’s accomplishments, I want to extend my heartfelt gratitude to our dedicated board, members, partners, and staff who have made these achievements possible. Your commitment and support drive our mission forward, and I look forward to another year of growth and impact.

POLICY DEVELOPMENT

BC Agriculture Council has continued to deliver vital policy input at both the provincial and federal levels, ensuring that member priorities are embedded in government programs and policy decisions. In response to heightened demand for policy insights during the 2024 Provincial Election, BCAC strengthened its internal infrastructure—enhancing coordination and member engagement to drive impactful, solution-focused advocacy for the agriculture sector.

In the spring, BCAC staff hosted 25 consultation meetings with member associations to verify policy priority areas identified through similar consultations in 2022 and 2023 and to obtain feedback on BCAC’s policy development work to date. Member associations endorsed the below sector-wide priorities for 2024, and feedback was uniformly positive about the need for and effectiveness of BCAC’s policy development role.

2024 KEY PRIORITIES

BCAC conducted annual consultation meetings with our member associations in Spring 2024. These consultations reaffirmed the importance of BCAC's four priority areas and sub-priorities:

COST OF PRODUCTION - CRITICAL INPUTS

- Carbon tax advocacy
- Minimum wage in B.C. subsidy
- Tax exemption on insurance premiums
- Advance Payment Program supplement

WATER SECURITY & STORAGE

- Agricultural Water Reserves
- Investment for storage
- Groundwater licensing

LABOUR

- MSP coverage delay for TFWs
- Flexibility for TFWs to move between farms
- Housing shortage driving up the cost of providing housing for workers. Need for financial support as employers try to construct new (improved) housing for workers.

EMERGENCY PLANNING & PREPAREDNESS

- Food Security Planning & Preparedness Project
- Provincial Agriculture Emergency Liaison training development
- Seat in Emergency Operations Centers (regional)
- Re-entry permits
- Disaster Financial Assistance Program improvements

PRIORITY OVERVIEW

WATER SECURITY & STORAGE

BCAC, alongside its members, played a leading role in shaping the B.C. Agriculture Water Infrastructure Program, successfully advocating for expanded eligibility criteria to better support producers. In addition, BCAC continues to push for greater investments in water storage infrastructure, the establishment of agricultural water reserves, and critical reforms to the groundwater licensing system to ensure long-term water security for B.C. farmers and ranchers.

COST OF PRODUCTION

In 2023 and 2024, rising input costs placed significant financial pressure on B.C. farmers and ranchers, prompting BCAC to push for targeted financial relief. Advocacy efforts focused on carbon tax relief, calling for exemptions, rebates, or re-investment of carbon tax dollars to ease the burden on producers. To address rising labour costs, BCAC proposed a wage subsidy to help offset the impact of B.C.'s increasing minimum wage. Additionally, BCAC advocated for a tax exemption on private insurance premiums, recognizing the strain of escalating costs, particularly in response to extreme weather events. To support farm cash flow, BCAC also called for an increase to the interest-free portion of the Advance Payments Program (APP) and proposed for the province to consider a supplement loans program as seen in other provinces, ensuring producers had greater financial flexibility in managing their operations.

LABOUR

Labour shortages, restrictive regulations, and rising housing costs continued to challenge farm employers in 2024. Formal policy positions were submitted on driver's license eligibility for Agricultural Stream workers, funding for workforce training programs, and long-term financial support for farm housing projects.

In addition, BCAC pushed for on-arrival MSP eligibility for Temporary Foreign Workers (TFWs) to prevent coverage gaps and reduce financial risks for both workers and employers. To address ongoing labour shortages, BCAC advocated for greater flexibility for TFWs to move between farms, ensuring a more adaptable workforce. Rising housing costs remained a pressing issue, leading BCAC to call for financial support programs to help farm employers construct new, improved worker housing that meets modern standards. BCAC also collaborated with the Ministry of Agriculture and Food to develop communications materials for farm employers, outlining their responsibilities under evacuation orders and alerts.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT & CLIMATE PREPAREDNESS

BCAC's Emergency Management and Climate Readiness Committee continued to drive critical policy improvements to safeguard farms from climate-related disasters. Key initiatives included:

- Shaping the B.C. Flood Strategy to enhance flood mitigation efforts and protect agricultural lands from severe weather impacts.
- Advocating to expand the Extreme Weather Preparedness Program, ensuring producers have access to the resources and tools needed to manage increasing climate-driven risks.
- Recommending improvements to the Disaster Financial Assistance Program – ensuring funding programs better reflect the unique challenges of farm businesses in post-disaster recovery efforts.
- Strengthening agriculture's role in emergency response and recovery through the Investment Agriculture Foundation funded Food Security Planning & Preparedness Project, outlined in more detail on page 9.

TARGETED ADVOCACY

BCAC made **19 unique submissions** to government covering a wide range of topics critical to the sector, including (but not limited to):

- The need for a **Provincial Agriculture Strategy**
- **On-arrival MSP coverage** for TFWs
- **TFW driver's license eligibility** for agricultural workers.
- **Aquaculture Policy Reform**
- **Labour strikes and supply chain disruptions** highlighting impacts on agriculture
- **Financial Relief for Farmers** – Permanent increase to the interest-free limit under the Advance Payments Program (APP) from \$100,000 to \$350,000 to ease financial pressures on producers.
- **Preventing Burdensome National Fire Code Changes** – BCAC successfully prevented costly changes, protecting farm businesses from unnecessary regulatory burdens.
- **Addressing Agricultural Plastic Waste** – Identified solutions for managing agricultural plastic waste.

More so than in previous years, BCAC was also called upon to provide input on programming and administrative processes. For example, BCAC staff contributed to the rapid development of program eligibility criteria under the expanded Agricultural Water Infrastructure Program, as well as a detailed proposal for a Premier's Task Force on Agri-Food Competitiveness and Growth.

In anticipation of an upcoming provincial general election, BCAC also proactively communicated the needs of its membership to government, including identifying the need for a provincial initiative similar to the Canada Carbon Rebate for Small Businesses, funding for on-farm apprenticeship programs, on-arrival Medical Service Plan coverage for temporary foreign workers, long-term flood mitigation infrastructure funding, and more.

LOOKING FORWARD

Both the federal and provincial governments increasingly rely upon BCAC for policy input and the development of programming or administrative processes relevant to the interests of BCAC's member associations. This means that policies and programs adopted by both levels of government increasingly reflect member interests.

AGRICULTURE EMERGENCY RESPONSE PROJECT

Emergency events in B.C. are becoming more frequent and severe, threatening farms, ranches, and the province's food security. To build a stronger, more resilient agriculture sector, BCAC is leading a coalition of seven farm organizations to enhance the sector's emergency preparedness and response.

WHAT WE'RE DOING

- **Project Development** – Sought and received project funding support from the Investment Agriculture Foundation's Food Security Emergency Planning & Preparedness Fund.
- **Emergency Planning** – Developing a coordinated BCAC Emergency Management Plan to guide its actions before, during, and after emergencies.
- **Agriculture Coordinators** – Trained 59 individuals in 2024 to assist local authorities in protecting farms and livestock.
- **Access Pass System** – Worked with the Province and some local authorities on potential enhancements to a standardized access system to help farmers safely reach their properties during emergencies.
- **Farmer Training** – Hosting regional workshops in conjunction with AgSafe in 2025 to help farmers and ranchers prepare for crisis events.



STRONGER TOGETHER

The plan supports the agriculture sector working with local governments and Indigenous communities in coordinating our emergency response approach and programs.

2024 PROVINCIAL ELECTION

DEFINING SECTOR PRIORITIES

Working closely with our 29 member associations, BCAC identified key priorities that formed the foundation of our advocacy efforts. These priorities remain crucial for advancing the sector's competitiveness and sustainability under the new government.


- **Provincial Agri-Food Competitiveness & Growth Strategy:** Develop a sustainable, competitive agricultural sector through a comprehensive action plan.
- **Increased Ministry Funding:** Increase investment in agriculture to levels comparable with other provinces.
- **Water Security:** Prioritize access to water resources for agriculture, including long-term storage solutions.
- **Emergency Management:** Strengthen measures to mitigate the impact of climate-related emergencies on the sector.
- **National Competitiveness:** Address the high costs and taxation that hinder B.C.'s agriculture sector from competing with other provinces.
- **Reconciliation:** Better integrate agriculture into the government's reconciliation efforts with Indigenous communities.
- **Land Prioritization:** Protect and enhance the productivity of land within the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR).
- **Processing Capacity:** Expand B.C.'s food processing infrastructure to ensure locally-produced food can be processed and distributed within the province.

KEEPING AGRICULTURE IN FOCUS

Ensuring that agriculture was top of mind for both voters and candidates was a cornerstone of BCAC's Government Relations strategy in 2024. In the months leading up to the provincial election, BCAC representatives engaged extensively with political candidates and stakeholders to drive home the importance of agriculture sector priorities.

These efforts not only influenced public discourse but also led to unprecedented mentions of agricultural priorities in party platforms. Through a combination of regional engagement, leadership meetings, and stakeholder outreach, BCAC successfully elevated the sector's voice at a critical time for provincial policymaking.

PROVINCIAL & FEDERAL ENGAGEMENT

Quarterly meetings with Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada (AAFC) and the B.C. Ministry of Agriculture and Food provides an ongoing platform for collaboration on issues impacting the sector. These meetings ensure continuous dialogue on sector priorities such as water access, labour support, and climate readiness.

EXPANDING THE NETWORK

To further extend its influence, BCAC is exploring opportunities to diversify its stakeholder base through associate memberships and new funding sources. This initiative aims to foster stronger partnerships across industries and enhance the organization's long-term sustainability. As of January 2025, we have welcomed three new associate members!

EXPANDING INFLUENCE ACROSS GOVERNMENT

BCAC's strategic outreach has increased its influence at municipal, provincial, and federal levels. This growth reflects BCAC's effectiveness in shaping policy discussions on agriculture.

PROVINCIAL & MUNICIPAL HIGHLIGHTS

BC Economic Summit

BCAC organized a high-profile panel addressing agriculture challenges, fostering collaboration with local governments and professional associations.

BC Land Summit

BCAC's presentations on drought management and agricultural land use attracted strong interest, reinforcing its leadership in water and land security.

Union of BC Municipalities Convention

In addition to having a booth at the trade show, BCAC participated in two panels on water and emergency preparedness, further establishing its role in shaping municipal policies impacting agriculture. This coincided with our front-page op-ed on drought and water security in the *Vancouver Sun*.

FEDERAL ENGAGEMENT

At the national level, BCAC maintained a leadership role within the Canadian Federation of Agriculture (CFA). BCAC successfully led the adoption of two resolutions supported and passed at CFA's 2024 AGM:

Incentive programs for soil health and soil carbon sequestration:

CFA to pursue federal incentives for these practices as a key aspect of ongoing feedback on SCAP and discussions related to the next Canadian Agricultural Partnership agreement.

Support for Indigenous engagement:

CFA lobby the federal government to provide federal government funding that supports efforts by industry associations to engage with Indigenous Peoples on policy development and program design.

RAISING AGRICULTURE'S PROFILE IN THE MEDIA

In 2024, BCAC significantly elevated agriculture's visibility in the media, spotlighting key issues such as **water security**, **labour policies**, and **climate resilience**. Through expert commentary, op-eds, and high-profile interviews, BCAC has strengthened public awareness and positioned itself as a leading voice on matters affecting B.C.'s farming sector. These efforts have amplified advocacy initiatives and highlighted the urgent needs of local producers.

SECURING AGRICULTURAL WATER RESERVES:

An op-ed by Jeremy Dunn, Kevin Boon, and Danielle Synotte featured on the front page of the *Vancouver Sun* stressed the importance of protected water resources for B.C.'s food production. This article underscored the critical connection between water security and agricultural sustainability.

DROUGHT COVERAGE:

BCAC gained widespread media attention with the article, **"We're Being Vilified: With Droughts Increasing, B.C. Farmers Need Water Reserved for Food Production."** The piece advocated for the creation of agricultural water reserves, emphasizing the long-term risks to local food security.

LABOUR POLICY ADVOCACY:

David Mutz, chair of BCAC's Labour Committee, was featured in the *Vancouver Sun* after addressing a UN report that criticized Canada's temporary foreign worker program. His comments reinforced BCAC's leadership in pushing for critical reforms to labour policies that affect farm employers and workers.

LEVEL THE FIELD CAMPAIGN – 2024 ELECTION ADVOCACY

In the lead-up to the **2024 provincial election**, BCAC launched the **Level the Field campaign** to ensure agriculture remains a government priority. CCFI CONFERENCE

BCAC is a member of the **Canadian Centre for Food Integrity (CCFI)**. In October, we attended the Public Trust Summit, an annual gathering that brings together industry leaders to explore consumer perceptions, trust-building strategies, and emerging trends in the food system. A key highlight was the release of the 2024 Public Trust Research Results, offering valuable insights into consumer attitudes and trust in Canadian food production.

WALI GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

Despite a significant leadership transition, as I took on the role of General Manager, along with other emerging challenges, our small and dedicated Western Agriculture Labour Initiative (WALI) team remained focused on enhancing service delivery and operational efficiency ensuring workers arrived on time to meet employers' needs.

NEW CONSUL AND REPRESENTATIVE

The Mexican Consulate in Vancouver welcomed a new Consul General, Olga Beatriz García Guillén, who replaced Berenice Díaz Ceballos, in 2024. Additionally, Steve Brown was appointed as the new Senior Liaison Officer for Jamaica in the Okanagan, succeeding Donna Adams. Their arrival has further strengthened the collaboration between WALI and the Mexican and Jamaican governments, ensuring continued support for temporary foreign workers and employers in British Columbia.

UNEXPECTED DISRUPTIONS

A severe cold snap in January caused significant crop damage in the Okanagan, leading to over 770 worker cancellations processed by WALI. This underscored the need for agile support systems, prompting several upgrades to the WALI Online Portal. Additionally, on February 29, the Canadian government added a new visa requirement for Mexican nationals, further complicating the process. With reduced flights, WALI was critical in facilitating communication with Employment and

Social Development Canada (ESDC), the Ministry of Labour in Mexico, and employers, ensuring workers could still arrive on time. Employers continued to trust WALI's e-news for timely updates and support during this challenging time.

WALI ONLINE PORTAL

In 2024, the WALI online portal saw significant upgrades focused on efficiency, security, and user experience. A new internal message system was introduced for administration staff, enabling most inquiries to be responded to within 24 hours. Cybersecurity enhancements were also implemented to safeguard sensitive information.

A major advancement was the integration of Recognized Employer Pilot LMIA processing, which required substantial development efforts.

Overall, more than 550 LMIA applications were processed for SAWP Mexico, supporting over 1,500 active users through the WALI Online Portal.

MEXICO SAWP 50TH ANNIVERSARY

The Seasonal Agricultural Worker Program (SAWP), which began in 1974 with the arrival of 203 workers to Canada, has grown significantly, reaching over 26,000 workers by 2024.

To mark this milestone, the Consulate of Mexico hosted a special celebration at DeVry Greenhouses, commemorating both Mexico's Independence Day and the 50th anniversary of the SAWP program. WALI was present to support and witness this significant event.

CONSULTATIONS ON TFW PROGRAMS

Employment and Social Development Canada aims to develop a new agriculture and fish processing stream that builds on the strengths of the existing SAWP. WALI actively participated in the consultations, collaborating with employer groups and national organizations to ensure B.C. farmers' interests were well represented. WALI has already submitted feedback on accommodation, occupational scope, and healthcare provisions. Upcoming consultations in 2025 will focus on work permit and transportation requirements, as well as wages and deductions.

END-OF-SEASON SURVEY

The Temporary Foreign Agricultural Workers End of Season Survey, funded by MOSAIC, launched in

July. The campaign used both email and direct mail to reach employers with promotional information to share with workers. Over 2,000 employers were contacted resulting in over 300 worker surveys completed. Thank you for your help to amplify our message!

STRATEGIC PLAN

In October, KPMG delivered a 'What We Heard' report, providing valuable feedback from BCAC strategic planning. An ad-hoc committee was formed to guide the development of WALI's strategic plan, focusing on enhancing customer service, government relations, and stakeholder engagement.

Key priorities include:

- expanding value-added services,
- improving platform security, and
- appointing a new President and Vice-President to WALI's governance.
